The Vicar writes...

Have you ever wondered what Jesus' parables might have sounded like had he told them today? Methodist minister, Robert Walker, wrote a satirical collection of bible stories for his book, 'Politically Correct Parables' Here is an edited extract:

The Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:1-23) That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. He was seeking some quality time because the crowds kept violating his personal space. A person insensitive to Jesus' needs spotted him and spread the word that Jesus was sitting on the beach. Great crowds gathered about him and he had to get into a boat so he wouldn't be pushed into the sea and drown. Since he had their attention and they expected him to say something profound he told them a parable.

"An exploiter of Mother earth went out to sow some seeds. Not being educated in modern horticultural techniques, he randomly scattered seeds all over the soil. Some seed fell on the path and birds came and ate them. Other seeds fell on rocky ground and grew quickly but since there was no depth of soil, they had no roots and were scorched by the sun.

Other seeds fell in wetlands. These lands were protected by the Environment Agency and designated SSSI and therefore could not be cleared of weeds. The seeds couldn't grow because the weeds choked them.

Bridestowe Parish Council Report

There was a full meeting of the Parish Council on Wednesday 21st August.

Jon Boyd, Public Rights of Way Officer, Devon County Council(DCC) explained how the Parish Paths Partnership (P3) could help with the maintenance of our parish footpaths.
P3 is a partnership between DCC, Town and

P3 is a partnership between DCC, Town and Parish Councils and voluntary groups. The main aim is to harness local resources, knowledge and skills to complement the work of DCC, helping to ensure local rights of way are maintained and improved and used in a correct and responsible way. Allotments

A parishioner is keen to have an allotment. There needs to be a minimum of 6 people requesting an allotment before the Parish Council is obliged to find a suitable plot. Are others interested? If so, please contact the clerk or a member of the parish council.

BT Pole

The Parish Council has expressed an objection to the positioning of a BT pole slap bang in the middle of the path leading from the kerb to Riverside Store's door. By moving it a few feet to one side it shouldn't be an obstruction.

Potholes

Another member of the public highlighted the problem of potholes that are a nuisance within the village. The PC will report them if they have not already been flagged up. Any member of the public can report a pothole on line. Simply visit the website and follow the link.

Volunteer Group

The Council would like to thank the Volunteer Group for its continued hard work, waging war on litter, untidy paths and maintaining the community orchard. Other individuals do their bit too.

The group was formed in May 2017 and contributes to maintaining the overall spruceness of the village.

How to report a pothole or road defect in Devon

From the DCC website:


https://www.devon.gov.uk/roads-and-transpor t/report-a-problem/report-a-pothole/ Please do not report a pothole that has already been reported.

Our map displays potholes that have already been reported as well as potholes that have been scheduled for repair (indicated with a 'roadworks' sign).

If an icon is already present on the map, please do not create an additional report.

Each report we receive is assessed onsite by a trained highway safety inspector. We do not ignore any reports that we receive, however, we do have to prioritise our funding as we cannot afford to fix all of the problems that are reported to us.

We prioritise repairing potholes, on roads, that have a 40 mm (4 cm) vertical edge and are 300 mm (30 cm) wide as these are the biggest risk to highway users.



All reports should be assessed onsite within seven calendar days. Following the assessment, repairs will be carried out by the end of the next working day, seven or 28 calendar days (depending on the outcome of the assessment) if confirmed as a priority pothole.

We will repair smaller potholes, and other road surface issues, as and when resources are available and as part of our planned works programmes.

The image below illustrates a pothole with a vertical edge and is an actionable defect.

On 27/8/24 two potholes in Bridestowe village were marked on the map . AY

A Free Cruise by Howard Barkell

If you were informed that you had been chosen to receive a free cruise to catch some early autumn sun you might think how lucky is that. When further investigation showed that it was a one way trip to an unspecified destination on a ship well past its sell by date you might begin to have some doubts about its value. Whatever my feelings might have been about such a chance I had no choice, it was not an offer but an order.

On arrival at the Ocean Terminal at Southampton on Monday, 10th September, our long train hauled by two large steam engines disgorged about five hundred fully equipped soldiers on to the dockside. Another similar trainload had already embarked. In those days equipment was of pre-war design and made of cotton canvas with brass fittings. Everything was fixed to the belt worn around the waist and two braces or cross straps fitted over the shoulders and fixed to the belt front and back. To both braces on the front were fixed an ammunition pouch. On the top of the back was a large pack and underneath that a smaller pack, both containing essentials needed for day to day existence. Attached to the belt on the right hip was a water bottle and on the left a frog for holding a No. 4 bayonet or pigsticker as it was sometimes known. A haversack containing a respirator was worn on the chest. A small arm, usually a Lee Enfield .303 rifle, was slung over the right shoulder, although in some cases, including mine, it was a Sten submachine gun. That was marching order, but things like best uniform, best boots, waterproof cape, spare bits of clothing, etc had to be packed into the cylindrical kit bag. At the top of all this was the steel helmet. In order to climb the narrow gangplank the kitbag had to be hoisted onto the shoulders. The most unnecessary item for a warm climate was the greatcoat which was draped over the top of the large pack and securely tied with cord.

The vessel that was awaiting us was not one of the luxury transatlantic liners like the Queen Elizabeth, which usually berthed here, but something much smaller and less salubrious. The Ubena had been built at Hamburg in 1928 for the German East Africa Line for voyages between Hamburg and the previous German East African colonies, travelling via the Cape. Requisitioned at the outbreak of war she was used as a U Boat depot ship until 1945 when she was converted to a hospital ship and made several trips between Danzig and Copenhagen rescuing wounded German troops and refugees fleeing the advancing Russian army. Seized at the end of the war from Travemunde as part of war reparations she was converted into a troopship and renamed the Empire Ken. It was scrapped in Scotland in 1957.

We immediately encountered what was to be a recurring problem on an overcrowded ship and that was a long queue, this time before embarking, later for obtaining meals or washing facilities. To accommodate so many men bunks had been replaced by four tier standees and all former service family areas were filled in the same way. I managed to bag a top bunk. One stripe had to have some advantages! It was common to have to wait patiently for over an hour before reaching the cookhouse to collect a meal and eat it sitting on the deck.

We sailed off down Southampton Water, passed the Esso Refinery at Fawley and the Flying Boat base at Calshot, before negotiating The Solent and Spithead before turning west into the Channel. By this time we were queuing below decks to draw bedding from the Stores. Unfortunately we were heading into a south westerly storm. Waves were breaking over the bow, washing along the deck and draining down beside us into the lower decks. Mission accomplished and bedding in place it wasn't long before several of us were racing to the toilets to see who would be sick first. Sea sickness is not a condition I would wish on anybody. This rough weather continued right across the Bay of Biscay, but at least it had stopped raining. We passed a U.S. Destroyer travelling northwards at speed which at times seemed to disappear under the waves.

We passed Gibraltar at night and the Mediterranean was much calmer and warmer. Apart from some P.E. exercises and a bit of target practice firing rifles at a target pulled behind the ship, life was limited to perambulating the deck or sitting against the rails. Our only port of call was at Oran where we docked to refuel. Nobody

was allowed to leave the ship. Later that evening we passed close to the brightly lit up city of Algiers.

The engines of our elderly lady broke down twice and we were becalmed for a few hours each time until the crew fixed the problem, but a week after leaving Southampton we arrived at Valletta. Despite living up to its name of Grand Harbour it was crammed with both naval and merchant vessels all congregating for a move towards Egypt, so we had to drop anchor away from the shore.

We had been told that we were to disembark here so were dressed in our brand new warm weather uniforms, dark blue beret, khaki drill bush jacket (sleeves rolled above the elbows), shorts (just above the knee), woollen hosetops, short canvas gaiters, black hobnailed boots (highly polished!). The descent loaded with all our equipment down the accommodation ladder the from top deck to the waiting motorboats was somewhat precarious. The only real mishap was when the sling on Gunner Grey's Sten gun came undone and it sank to the bottom of the harbour. A convoy of typical Maltese buses was waiting on the quayside to take us on a grand tour to an unknown destination.

<u>Lunar cycle for</u> <u>September</u>

New moon 3rd First quarter 11th Full moon 18th Last quarter 24 th



September's 'harvest moon', sometimes the 'barley moon', is one of the most familiar Moon names and refers to the nearest full moon to the autumnal equinox. The light of the Harvest Moon enabled farmers to work late into the night bringing in the crops from the fields.

What are the phases of the Moon?

When we look up at the Moon, we don't always see the same amount of its surface being lit up. This apparent change in the shape of the Moon is known as its 'phase'.

The phases of the Moon are caused by the relative positions of the Moon, Sun and Earth. Because the Moon produces no visible light of its own, we can only see the parts of the Moon that are lit up by other objects. A small amount of light comes from distant stars and the reflection of light from the Earth (known as Earthshine). However the main source of light for the Moon is the Sun. At almost all times, half of the Moon is being lit up by the Sun, but this need not be the half that is facing towards the Earth. The only exception is during a lunar eclipse.

If the Moon is between the Earth and the Sun in its orbit, then the back side of the Moon is being lit up and the side facing the Earth is in darkness. This is called a new Moon. If the Moon is on the other side of the Earth compared to the Sun, then the near side of the Moon will be fully lit up: a full Moon. How many phases of the Moon are there? In between these, the Moon goes through multiple stages of partial illumination during its different phases. These are the banana-shaped crescent Moon, the D-shaped quarter Moon and the almost complete gibbous Moon.

Finally, each phase is also named after its position in the full 29.5 day cycle based on whether it is growing (waxing) or shrinking (waning).

The eight phases of the Moon in order are:

new Moon
waxing crescent Moon
first quarter Moon
waxing gibbous Moon
full Moon
waning gibbous Moon
last quarter Moon
waning crescent Moon.

The full, quarter and new Moons are all the instants in time when the Moon is exactly fully, half or not at all illuminated from our perspective on Earth. The crescent and gibbous Moons each last approximately a week.

NB On 18th September there will be a partial lunar eclipse.

Meldon Viaduct bridge deck closure

Meldon Viaduct bridge deck will be completely closed from Monday 9 September to Friday 27th September.



What we are doing

The existing anti-slip surface will be removed and the timber deck will be inspected to ensure it is structurally safe, and where necessary it will be replaced. New anti-slip boards will then be installed on the full 165-metre span of the viaduct.

There is no a suitable alternative off road diversion route available. Trail users are advised to either postpone their visit until works are complete. or to select their own alternative travel arrangements. Please do not attempt to enter the works area or to try to cross the viaduct until the works are completed and the viaduct has been reopened.

The history

Meldon Viaduct, a significant historical structure, in fact it's a Scheduled Monument, and one of only two remaining railway bridges in the UK made with wrought iron lattice piers and trusses. Opened in 1874, it was part of the LSWR's strategy to compete with the GWR's coastal route by providing an alternative inland route to South Devon and Cornwall. The viaduct underwent expansions and modifications, including a second viaduct in 1879 for track widening, additional bracing in 1938, and concrete reinforcement to support wartime traffic. Passenger services ceased in 1968, and it served as a haul road until 1990 when it closed due to load concerns. After assessments and repairs, it reopened in 1996 as part of a trail for cyclists and pedestrians.

Along with his friend, Robert Burnard, SBG organised the first scientific archaeological excavations of hut circles on Dartmoor at Grimspound during 1893. Others soon joined them and the Dartmoor Excavation Committee was



formed. Their work was not without criticism, but their work in identifying an re-erecting significant stones contributed to their protection from anyone who might fancy a block of granite.

Our speaker has spent 25 years with the Dartmoor National Park Association, the last five years as Senior Archaeologist so this should be an extremely interesting talk about SBG's archaeological work on Dartmoor and elsewhere in Devon.

Elderberries

Make the most of dark, fragrant elderberries while they're in season.



Cooking with elderberries

can get messy but it's worth it. They're full of health-giving properties and have been used medicinally for centuries. There are lots of elderberry recipes out there but here's a favourite.

Elderberry syrup

Elderberries and ginger may have anti-viral properties, so get ready for winter and make a stash of elderberry syrup. Add cinnamon and ginger to taste.

It's easy to make and you can eat it by the spoonful, drizzle onto porridge or yogurt, or add a dash to fizzy wine.

Method

- Carefully separate your elderberries from their stalks with a fork or your hands
 - Chop up a little ginger into small pieces
- Put the elderberries and chopped ginger into a pan and cover them with water
- Bring to the boil and let simmer for 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and allow to cool slightly
- Pour the mixture through a jelly bag or muslin (fine cloth) and allow the juice to drip through. Extract as much liquid as possible
- Pour the elderberry liquid into a measuring jug, and measure how much you have. Now add equal parts sugar to the liquid mixture so if you measured 500ml of juice, add 500g of sugar, or if you have 1 litre of liquid, add 1 kilo of sugar
- Add the sugar and a little ground cinnamon or cinnamon stick to the strained liquid. Simmer for five minutes and then cool and pour into sterilised bottles

Movie Watch August 2024

While the 'Coming Soon' page on the New Carlton website is hardly awash attractive titles, there are finally a few through the greenish shoots peeping undergrowth. Okehampton There's no guarantee any of these will actually reach West Devon, but the Merlin Group feel sufficiently confident to notify us of their presence in the schedules. In each case the film sounds OK, while the cast unquestionably strong,

The Critic (Ian McKellen, Gemma Arterton, Mark Strong) released 13th September.

Jimmy Erskine is the most feared theatre critic of the age. His newspaper's new owner, David Brooke, stands for patriotism and family values. It's not long before Brooke fires Erskine for his outrageous behaviour and opinions, in particular a savage review of actress Nina Land. Erskine picks up on this cue and exploits the opportunity to get his job back. He writes a glowing review for Nina, promises her a glittering career, but nothing is ever quite that simple. **The Critic** is based on the 2015 novel, *Curtain Call*, by Anthony Quinn.

Lee (Kate Winslet, Andy Samberg) also goes on General Release on 13th September.

Kate Winslet stars in the story of Lee Miller, an American fashion model who became an acclaimed War Correspondent for Vogue magazine. Determined to document the truth of the Nazi regime, in spite of the odds stacked against female correspondents, Lee captured some of the most important images of the conflict, for which she paid a significant personal price. Well received by the critics, this one sounds decent.

The Outrun (Saoirse Ronan, Paapa Essiedu, Stephen Dillane), released 27th September.

After a decade away in London, 29-year-old Rona returns home to the Orkney Islands. Sober but lonely, she tries to suppress her memory of the events which set her on this

journey of recovery. Gradually the beauty and history of the land takes hold and Rona finds hope and strength among the heavy gales and the bracingly cold sea. Not sure, but I'd always give Saoirse Ronan the benefit of the doubt.

It Ends With Us (Blake Lively, Justin Baldoni, Brandon Sklenar), now showing.

This is the first Colleen Hoover novel to be adapted for the screen. It tells the story of Lily Bloom, a woman who overcomes a traumatic childhood to embark on a new life in Boston and chase a lifelong dream of opening her own business. A chance meeting with neurosurgeon Ryle Kincaid sparks a strong connection, but as the two fall in love, Lily begins to see sides of Ryle that remind her of her parents' stormy relationship. The novel has sold well over a million copies, while the film has received strong reviews.

Deadpool & Wolverine is another Marvel Studios title with a predictably strong cast (Ryan Reynolds, Hugh Jackman, Emma Corrin). This one opened at the New Carlton on 23rd August and will undoubtedly be popular, although surprisingly it's only been granted screenings in the smaller, upstairs Screen 3. Very comfy seats though, so confidently recommended, even on that basis alone!

It's no longer showing at the New Carlton but a couple of local cinema-goers mentioned **Twisters**, the climate thriller in which multiple dynamic weather systems converge in spectacular fashion over the plains of Oklahoma. 'Good knockabout fun' seemed to be the general consensus. I shouldn't worry about missing that one. I'm sure it'll turn up on one of the streaming services before long.

One such film, which rapidly transitioned to Netflix, was the gloriously foul-mouthed **Wicked Little Letters**, mentioned here in March as a cinema title, starring Olivia Colman, Jessie Buckley and

Timothy Spall. We loved it but I'm aware opinion was very much split on this one. What is beyond question, however, is the quality of the cast. Check it out and see what you think. Feel free to blame me if you're offended!

TV output in August, certainly in terms of transmission hours, was completely dominated by coverage of the **2024 Summer Olympics**, predominantly staged in and around Paris.

Broadcast rights to the Games were held by Warner Bros Discovery, meaning that the BBC were left to transmit whatever was made available to them by Warners. Broadcast scraps from an extremely wealthy man's table. At one stage I found myself watching the 67kg Taekwondo heats on BBC with no idea that Discovery were simultaneously showing the Mens 5,000m Athletics Final from the Stade de France!

However I thought the BBC coverage was generally excellent. Those I took to be their lead presenters - Clare Balding, Gabby Logan, Mark Chapman and Hazel Irvine – were superb. Less convincing was the analysis provided in support of some lesser-known events for which expert observers were clearly in short supply. I was watching some Synchronised Diving, with absolutely no understanding of what I was looking at. The commentary was no help whatsoever.

"Wow. Just wow" was the less-thaninsightful voice-over from the Aquatic Centre as two Chinese competitors entered the pool in tandem, with barely a ripple between them.

I gather a total of 30m individuals watched the Games on BBC through their linear channels, as well as 49m viewing requests made through the iPlayer. The Opening Ceremony peaked at a level of 8.1m viewers. Otherwise, a few recent programmes at least one of us has enjoyed. Who knows? You may find something of interest here on one of the catch-up services?

Dartmoor dig uncovers 'stunning' Early Bronze Age burial cist

Archaeologists have made 'stunning' discoveries after excavating an Early Bronze Age burial cist at Cut Hill, one of Dartmoor's most isolated hills.

Led by Dartmoor National Park Authority painstaking work revealed an exceptional cist – a stone-built box used to bury the dead in prehistoric times – containing well-preserved wood and a host of other material yet to be identified.

The Authority is now seeking funding for micro-excavations of the cist and the future conservation of any artefacts, and is encouraging people to support this exciting project by choosing to Donate for Dartmoor. The discovery has parallels to the cist unearthed at Whitehorse Hill in 2011. The finds changed our understanding of Early Bronze Age life on Dartmoor.

Cut Hill stands at 603-metres high – one of five peaks on Dartmoor that's over 600m – and lies within the military firing ranges.

Cist excavations were prompted when local historian Paul Rendell reported to the Authority that the feature was eroding out of the peat.

Site surveys and analysis, including radiocarbon dating of charcoal from inside the cist, gave a date of around 1,800BC – or 3,800years old.

In May, Dartmoor National Park Authority unanimously supported a full archaeological intervention.

Roadford Lake

It's hard to believe that the enormous Roadford Lake once housed a number of buildings and farms before it was selected as a site for a reservoir in July 1975. Today, it's the biggest inland waterway in the South West, but it was once a bitter battleground between farmers and Dartmoor conservationists.

The lake is 130ft deep and covers 730 acres of land (8,140 million gallons of water). It has now become a beautiful watersports centre and nature lovers paradise, surrounded by countryside, and nestled in the Wolf Valley with the dramatic tors of Dartmoor as its backdrop.

The reservoir now supplies North Devon and water is also released into the River Tamar system which is treated and then supplied to Plymouth and parts of South West Devon.



Wildflower of the month - Yarrow Achillea millefolium

Yarrow can be found in many grasslands, from lawns to meadows, flowering from June to November. Yarrow is a tough plant, a strong-smelling perennial. It has dark green, finely divided, feathery leaves and clusters of white, flat-topped flower heads. Yarrow has been used to help restore arable land to grassland by sowing it along with other natives.



The wildlife value of Yarrow is high. It features on the RHS Plants for Pollinators' list and supporting over 100 species of insect. The larvae of many moths feed on the plant. Some bird species, such as starlings, use Yarrow to line their nests. It is thought they do so because yarrow may have parasite-killing abilities.

Common yarrow is toxic to dogs, cats, and horses. Consumption can cause vomiting and diarrhoea as well as depression (?) anorexia, and hypersalivation. The plant is named after Greek's hero Achilles, who used yarrow to treat the battle wounds of his soldiers. Yarrow is also known as Carpenter's Weed because carpenters often use it to stop the bleeding from the wounds and cuts that are inevitable part of their work.



News from Lydford Gorge National Trust Rose Cooke, Visitor Experience Officer

Well for once the long-range forecast for August was pretty accurate. It was changeable with some lovely hot days, and some wetter days too. As we go through September I'll be enjoying any sunny days and keeping my fingers crossed for a colourful autumn.

We welcomed a new Area Ranger for West Dartmoor in August. Demelza has moved on to work with the National Trust on the North Cornwall coast, and we have taken on Crystal who comes to us from Devon Wildlife Trust. Feel free to say hello if you see her. She will be getting to grips with the gorge and the other areas we look after on Dartmoor, Crystal will continue the work to survey more of the flora and fauna in the gorge to help inform how we will continue to look after it into the future.

You may have noticed a lack of insects around this summer. Especially butterflies, bees and hoverflies. Some of this is probably down to the cool and wet spring we had across much of the country. But there has been a much longer-term decline. Surveys going back 20 years show that the number of flying insects sampled on vehicle number plates has fallen by 78%. The data was collected by citizen scientists who recorded the number of insects splattered on their number plates after driving. The survey will continue annually to generate crucial data on flying insect populations across the UK. You can get involved through the Bugs Matter app from Buglife.
