The Vicar writes...

Christmas happens on 25th December every year. It's amazing how many times I don't realise this until it's too late. The mad rush for last minute Christmas presents from the Shell garage on Christmas Eve is now as traditional as turkey. On the whole I still enjoy Christmas, even though it's been swallowed up in a great consumer fest there's still a remnant of something important and magical.

A lot of people say Christmas is for the kids and once you stop believing in Father Christmas the magic goes. This year, in order to keep the magic, I've decided to show Father Christmas really does exist – prove me wrong. Just because you can't see, touch, hear something doesn't mean it doesn't exist-love or the laws of mathematics. Some things cannot exist, like a square circle or dry water. 


So, Father Christmas exists. Have a thoughtful Advent, a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



Scored for soloists and a mixed choir with orchestra, the Mass in C (K.317) is one of Mozart's most popular and enduring works. Written in 1779, probably commissioned by the Archbishop of Salzburg for performance on Easter Sunday, its nickname derives from its first documented performance at the coronation of Holy Roman Emperor Francis I in 1792, though it may also have been performed at the coronation of Leopold II the previous year. Celebratory in nature, the Mass would have been perfectly fitting for either a coronation or an Easter Day service. Bridestowe Parish Council report

At the full meeting of the Parish Council on 2nd November the following matters were discussed. The variegated sycamore in the centre of the village behind the bus shelter is to be reduced in size.

The multi play equipment and the surface beneath it is to be brushed regularly in an attempt to reduce its slipperiness.

Councillors gave permission for the installation of a galvanised holder in the ground that will support the Christmas tree each year. (See update below)

The '20 is Plenty' signs have been given a stay of execution. As long as they are not "impacting the highway user on safety grounds" and are on private land, they can remain.

The Council is seeking to purchase a plot of land for allotments. Seven parishioners have submitted requests so far. If there are other people interested in having an allotment, please contact the clerk.

And....talking of the clerk, Kayleigh Walker has successfully completed her six months' probationary period and the Council is delighted to welcome her on board in a permanent role.

A message from Chris and Helen Proctor and team..

Bridestowe's Christmas tree will be going up this year, however, due to the unseasonably warm/wet weather last year, a more permanent structure is needed in place to support the tree not only for this year but for many years to come. The tube for the tree is with the fabricators and needs to be galvanised and we'll need a small window of dry weather to get the post sunk and the concrete to set, However, this will mean that it'll be going up at short notice and later than it would otherwise. We'll be using Facebook when we have more information to let people know.

An Amazing Achievement by Howard Barkell

A few weeks ago, on one of those mild still afternoons, we decided to take a walk from that pull-in on the left hand side going towards Mary Tavy half way across Blackdown by Barrett's Bridge on the A386 to the Wheal Jewell Reservoir and back. The most direct route is the follow the dry bed of the Reddaford leat. It is not that comfortable a walk because of the overgrown nature of the tussocky grass and the narrowness of the sheep tracks, but it is mostly flat and, on this occasion was remarkably dry underfoot. The word wheal gives the clue to the leat's original purpose. Derived from the Cornish (many miners migrated from Cornwall to Devon at the end of the 1700s) wheal means a place of work and many tin and copper mine names were preceded by the word, so locally we have Wheal Betsy, Wheal Friendship and Wheal lewell to name but three.

One of the most important issues to face the early underground miners was water. A regular flow above ground was needed to power the waterwheels which worked the machinery to raise and crush the ore, the natural ingress of water into the underground workings had to be constantly pumped out, ironically by the use of waterwheels. The three mines previously mentioned could not develop by relying on the often meagre flow of the Cholwell Brook. The alternative use of steam power still needed water and even with the early use of peat as a fuel the added cost often made the extraction of ore unprofitable. The nearest source of a reliable supply of water was the River Tavy and the lowest point on the river to enable a flow to reach the mines was in Tavy Cleave, but there were formidable engineering obstacles in between. Possibly surveyed by John Taylor, the manager at Wheal Friendship, the leat, sometimes called the Reddaford Leat, was opened by the early years of the nineteenth century. The intake is guarded by a strong grille to catch debris flowing downstream. The adjoining small building presumably still has some useful purpose. The leat then curves around the hillside under Ger Tor and Nat Tor until it reaches the site of Reddaford Farm,

abandoned when The War Department bought the Willsworthy Manor estate from the Calmady-Hamlyn family in 1905 to form a live firing small arms range. The Palmer children who lived there would walk in to Lydford School except during the hardest weather.

At Reddaford a low weir across the Willsworthy Brook enables the leat to cross and, via a sharp left turn, to continue its course. Originally much of its water entered the Cholwell Brook and continued downstream to Mary Tavy and Wheal Friendship. Another leat took water to Wheal Betsy and then to the Cholwell Brook. An extension to the Reddaford Leat brought water under Barrett's Bridge and then along the lower slopes of Gibbet Hill parallel to the A386 to work waterwheels at Black Down, also known as North Wheal Friendship Mine. Some lead ore was sold from there in 1850, but it ceased production soon after. Betsy was worked intermittently for lead and some zinc and silver ore, but finally closed in 1877. The present engine house probably dates from 1865 when a 12 inch pumping engine was installed. It is suggested that peat was brought from the beds at Walkham Head for use as fuel. When copper could be obtained more cheaply from abroad Friendship turned to producing arsenic which was widely used as an insecticide against the bol weevil in the cotton plantations in America.

When Betsy and North Friendship closed presumably the parts of the leat serving them became redundant and that water was diverted into the Cholwell Brook. Friendship worked on until 1924, but Pelton Wheels had replaced the waterwheels in 1912. The later years were spent picking over the dumps for tin and arsenic and treating tin ore from Wheel Jewell. At their busiest the mines needed water for 17 waterwheels of varying sizes, 8 for pumping, four for hoisting and 5 for crushing and grinding.

Like the other mines Wheal Jewell had a chequered history, opening when the price of tin was high, closing when the price fell. It, too, finally closed in 1924. It did not use water from the Reddaford Leat, but had its own supply sourced from the Walla

Brook between Doe Tor and Barewalls. It originally crossed the larger leat on an aqueduct. Sydney Davey, a native of Horndon, who later lived in Bridestowe for many years, worked at the mine as a millman before joining 9th Devons in late 1915. A year later he was hit by a shrapnel shell when 'going over the top' at Ginchy and wounded in the left shoulder, leg and buttock. As a result of his injuries his left leg was amputated below the knee and he was later fitted with an artificial limb at Roehampton. His initial pension was 27 shillings and 6 pence a week. Another who worked there was Fred Screech. He lived on Vale Down and later at Southerly. He was discharged from the army suffering from serious deafness, attributed to by being an artilleryman.

In 1932 the privately owned West Devon Mining and Power Company opened a hydro electric power station at Mary Tavy. The water came from the Hill Bridge Leat which had previously served Wheal Friendship. The demand for electricity was so great that in 1936 the size of the power station was increased. Fortunately, the two leats were still running. The water for the new scheme was taken from them. Their courses were joined together and impounded in the concrete lined reservoir which covered the site of much of the Wheal Jewell mine workings. From the reservoir the water is piped downhill to the power station. From 1942 power was supplied to the National Grid. The facility is now owned by South West Water.

It sometimes appears that the water in the Reddaford Leat is running uphill. This is not the case, of course, but in the four and a half miles from source to end the level only drops twenty six feet, a remarkable feat of surveying and building over tortuous, difficult terrain without the aid of modern equipment and machinery.

Movie Watch October 2024

I'd love to report that we stumbled across a hidden, unexpected gem at the New Carlton last month, but those remain elusive. We've seen eight films at the cinema this year while pre-Covid our equivalent figure was up around 20.

However, as I write, with the snow fluttering down, we've arranged to see **Gladiator II** in Okehampton next week. To be honest, this would not normally feature on my radar but needs must and I am told that one should occasionally try new things.

The reviews have been mixed but the Guardian gave it four stars, promising a thrilling spectacle featuring a formidable performance, in the old Russell Crowe role, from Paul Mescal, who seems to be in just about everything these days.

The paper breathlessly reports, 'This is a sequel that isn't afraid to get its hands dirty - it delivers the keynote scenes and moments for the fanbase (which is all of us) and the all-important gladiator setpieces have the right hallucinatory quality.'

Bring it on. Rest assured one of your dedicated Movie Watch team will report back, although possibly not me.

The other New Carlton options are, to put it mildly, less than compelling. As I write, we have **Wicked**, 'making its long-awaited journey to the big screen' (Jeff Goldblum, Ariana Grande etc), alongside **Paddington in Peru**, 'the world's most beloved bear returns to his roots, his homeland Peru.'

This one features a very decent cast (Olivia Colman, Ben Whishaw, Antonio Banderas) in what is billed as 'a live-action animated adventure comedy film,' thereby sweeping the board with potential film descriptors. To be fair, the reviews are mostly positive so if you can find a suitable companion, why not give it a try?

Coming soon? Well, not much, to be honest. Certainly not this side of Christmas. **We Live in Time** (Andrew Garfield, Florence Pugh)

could be worth checking out. **Maria**, the Maria Callas biopic, tells the ultimately tragic story of the world's greatest female opera singer, but that doesn't open until early in the New Year.

So we're left with television options to ponder. Luckily there are quite a few.

The big November broadcast topic was the US Election, although as a TV event it fell a bit flat. In fact the result was pretty much confirmed before we all retired for the night. Maybe US political polls are more accurate than their UK equivalent?

Clive Myrie anchored the BBC coverage without ever achieving the required Dimbleby-level gravitas, Mark Austin was rock-solid in heading up the Sky News coverage, Tom Bradby was fine on ITV, while Channel 4 led with a very Channel 4 pairing of Boris Johnson and Stormy Daniels. No comment necessary.

On the domestic TV front, many column inches (more than it deserves) have been devoted to Gary Lineker's impending departure from Match of the Day. The BBC are in the fortunate position of having a ready-made replacement for their highest-paid presenter.

The excellent Mark Chapman joined the Corporation as a Continuity Announcer in 1996 and has progressed through the ranks. He knows the game inside out, is likeable, fluent, popular with both colleagues and viewers, making him clearly the right man for the job.

So I doubt it'll be him.

There's been a massive PR drive to appoint a woman to the role. Gabby Logan is a consummate presenter, filling in seamlessly for Lineker on occasions. Her father, Terry Yorath, was a Welsh international footballer, winning 59 caps for his country.

I don't suppose it'll be Gabby either.

The BBC will no doubt look to unearth a candidate who ticks all the necessary boxes. Their last attempt at such a manoeuvre saw Dan Walker replaced by the politically acceptable (but hopeless) Alex Scott as presenter of their Saturday lunchtime preview show. She has overseen a fall in average weekly audiences of almost 50%. Whatever, it should be worth keeping an eye

ACE Archaeology Club

One minute it is August and then it is Christmas.

ACE has been busy in the intervening time.
ACE and ACE members have been involved in a few things organised by other people in the last few months. Including some test pitting at Wrangworthy Barrows as support to the Monument Management Scheme (MMS). The MMS looks after sites that are scheduled monuments and tries to keep them in good condition. They have been doing some work in the ACE "area" and some ACE members went to help with the test pitting* at Wrangworthy Barrows.

*Test-pitting is used to assess the archaeological potential of a site and is a suitable when a rapid form of minimally intrusive evaluation is required. It is designed to recover a sample of artefacts from topsoil and subsoil deposits, with the bonus of providing a "snapshot "of any buried archaeological remains.

On our own ACE Day in October, we repeated a visit to Winkleigh for a tour of the village focusing on its long and varied history.

Although it hasn't been long since we did this it was decided that we should do it again as we have had so many new members this year. Included in the tour was a visit to Heywood Castle, a Motte and Bailey castle overlooking Eggesford. There is a surprising number of such castles in the area, not far from Haywood is Eggesford Castle, not accessible as on private property, and Winkleigh has two such mounds; one on private property and one under the village hall!! There must have been a lot of trouble from the inhabitants of the area.

Friends of St Bridget's update - The Tumbling Tower and Perilous Pinnacles

You may have been wondering what FOSB have been doing over the last few years - apart from the regular Clean-up Days. The simple answer is collecting money for a big project, so those £6 per year some people have been contributing as members, has been quietly adding up!

To take on a big project, grant money is required, and most grants ask for match funding.

A few years ago, FOSB was successful in obtaining money to tackle part of the roof and the gutters and re-leading the tower roof. Sadly, the tower needs a much bigger renovation. Despite the re-leading being able to reduce water entering the tower from the roof, it has by no means stopped water getting in elsewhere and as the walls have been treated over the years with non-porous materials, significant damp has been collecting resulting in rotting joists and floorboards and crumbling masonry. The pinnacles have continued to deteriorate, and stone falls off intermittently - some to the ground and some onto the new roof damaging the lead.

After the recent Quinquennial inspection (a five yearly inspection by a surveyor – paid for by the parish but insisted upon by the diocese), it became clear that the tower was a

huge project needing to be tackled - and tackled fairly urgently! FOSB has set up a subgroup from the committee to try and raise funds and deal with the multiple issues in the tower. It has also been agreed that repairs to the stainedglass windows also need addressing - another expensive job. The need to get diocese agreement to the plans is in the form of a Faculty, which is required and for which the diocese will charge us, but there is no funding likely to be offered from the diocese for any of the work.

This is a very ambitious undertaking. We feel the tower repairs alone are likely to be over £100,000 – possibly even multiples of this amount. Before any grants are applied for specialists need to define what works are needed, quotes from appropriate building firms need to be obtained and this all presented to the diocese with a statement regarding the relevance of the church building in the community. If the plans are approved there is usually a time limit on the Faculty approval. It is only at this stage that grants can then be applied for.

FOSB will need to finance the specialist reports with no guarantee that the work can be undertaken – either because the diocese refuses a Faculty or the grant application is not successful. We are hoping this will not be the case and look forward to a dry, safe and renovated tower, and restored windows being the outcome.

We are launching our appeals for new members (at £6 a year -as the numbers of members will help confirm that the church is important to the community – and you don't have to be a regular churchgoer to want the building to remain as a church), and donations for any amount at the Christmas tree festival.

Come and see our tree and help us get this project moving!



A 1960s Christmas

Christmas in the 1960s was in many respects quite similar to Christmas celebrations in the 21st century: family gatherings, laughter and fun. But whereas today the celebrations are often centred around the presents and multimedia, in the 1960s Christmas was much more homespun.

The days of post war rationing and austerity were still recent memories so, especially in the early years of the decade, 1960s Christmases still had a feeling of frugality when compared to those of today.

Paper Chains

Take the decorations, for example. Today, we are used to homes decorated both indoors and out with lights, animated figures and all manner of festive adornments. In the 1960s, things were much simpler. Brightly coloured paper chains were made by the family and looped across the walls of the living room. If money was scarce the chains would be made from strips of newspaper. These chains would be finished off with honeycomb-like paper or foil decorations shaped like bells and stars. There would also be holly sprigs pushed behind the pictures on the wall. The tree would be covered in tinsel and glass baubles and often topped with a Christmas fairy. Quite often there would also be a nativity scene, either bought or homemade. Indeed, most years the children's TV programme Blue Peter gave instructions on how to make your own. Blue Peter, always inventive and often defying health and safety, even taught small children

how to make an advent crown from wire coat hangers, with a lit candle at each corner!

Food preparations began with the making of the Christmas cake and Christmas puddings. This was usually three or four weeks before the day itself: a sixpence might be stirred into the pudding batter for luck.

Christmas began for many families on Christmas Eve. Most shops and businesses worked until at least lunchtime on Christmas Eve: this was also the day when the festive food and drink was bought. There were few home freezers so all the produce for Christmas lunch had to be bought as close as possible to the day itself. Orders were taken by the butcher, greengrocer and baker as supermarkets were only just beginning to open in the high street. The whole family, except those working, would be needed to collect the food, as there was a great deal to be carried home.

All over the country, pots and bottles of loose change, collected over the year, would be emptied in order to pay for the Christmas drinks. Alcohol was purchased from the off licence – often a section of the local pub. All shops would be closed on Christmas Day and Boxing Day, so if something was forgotten, it was too late – which could be a catastrophe, if batteries for the longed-for Christmas toy had been forgotten!

On Christmas Eve at bedtime, parents would ceremoniously lay out a plate with a mince pie and a glass of sherry (Harvey's Bristol Cream, of course) for Father Christmas, by the Christmas tree. Sometimes a carrot would also be left for Rudolph.

Stockings or pillow cases were left by the beds upstairs, ready to be filled with gifts – if the child had been good, of course!

Every year the stocking would contain a satsuma or mandarin orange, a walnut and a coin. Often there were also chocolate coins, a chocolate selection box, puzzle books, small toys, crayons and an annual, often Beano or Dandy: the main present would have been wrapped and placed under the tree downstairs.

Main presents were opened after breakfast: for children these might be a watch (perhaps a Tic-a-Tic-a-Timex), Scalextric or a Sindy doll. Other favourite gifts included Etch-a-Sketch, Meccano, 3D View Master and the Amazing Magic Robot that

answered questions. Relatives might also bring homemade gifts, such as hand knitted jumpers and scarves.

The main event at Christmas lunch was not always turkey: the meat of choice might be chicken, capon or goose. Chicken in the early 1960s was an expensive meat, as this was before factory farming. The Christmas table was not decorated with special Christmas-themed items as it might be today: this was the occasion for the 'best' tablecloth, china, glass and silver, brought out just for special occasions and packed away safely through the rest of the year. Christmas crackers would be laid out by the place settings at the table: it was obligatory to wear the paper hats throughout the meal!

The meal began with soup, often Baxters rather than homemade and usually something gamey like 'Highland Broth', which in those days tasted a little like dishwater with small pieces of gristle, but was part of the Christmas tradition and so appeared ever year!

The turkey came with all the trimmings: chipolatas or pigs in blankets, bread sauce and stuffing. The stuffing was sometimes sausagemeat and sometimes chestnut, a little more luxurious than the usual sage and onion. Roast potatoes, mashed potatoes, carrots, parsnips and of course, sprouts accompanied the meat.

The Christmas pudding then made a very special, theatrical entrance, wreathed in flame from the brandy that had been poured over it and lit.

After the washing up, the family would gather around the one TV in the house or if there was no TV, around the wireless. All would stop at 3pm for the Queen's Christmas broadcast.

There were just two TV channels in the early 1960s: the BBC and ITV, the commercial channel. These were joined in 1964 by BBC2. For some inexplicable reason, quite often through the 1960s the main two TV companies would both schedule a circus on Christmas afternoon: Billy Smart's Circus on the BBC and another on ITV!

The evening meal on Christmas Day was always the same every year: cold cuts of meat, usually ham and leftover turkey from lunch, pork pie, bread rolls, tomatoes, pickles and crisps, trifle, mince pies and chocolate log. Pride of place on the table would be the Christmas cake, covered in white icing and decorated with a Father Christmas figure, some reindeer perhaps, a robin or two and maybe a sprig of plastic holly. These wonderful if mismatched cake decorations were added to over the years, so quite often the robin might end up towering over both Father Christmas and the reindeer!

Boxing Day was the day for visiting family. Car ownership was becoming more common, making family get-togethers easier. Lunch might be roast beef or lamb, or leftover roast turkey.

And then the Christmas festivities were over for another year!

The winter months can be difficult for many of us, with the colder weather and shorter daylight hours affecting everything from our finances to our feelings.

We've put together a series of special edition 'winter support and wellbeing' newsletters to share information and advice to help you and your families to stay well, warm, happy and safe this winter. This one is about help with the cost of living, because if you don't have enough money to live on, it's important to make sure you know what support is available.

Household Support Fund

The Government has made funding available to local councils so that they can offer direct support to those most in need in their area. It's called the Household Support Fund.

It must be used to help people who are struggling to pay for food, energy, water bills and other related essentials, and specifically those households that may not be eligible for other support that is already available from the Government.

This year, Devon has been allocated a little over £5 million, and we are working closely with Devon's eight District, City and Borough councils as well as voluntary and community partners on several schemes that will support our most vulnerable residents over the coming months. Citizens Advice Devon energy vouchers

If you're struggling to pay your energy bill or have a prepay meter and can't afford to top it up, Citizens Advice Devon can help.

We've given Citizens Advice Devon money from the Government's Household Support Fund to provide fuel vouchers for electricity and gas to anyone struggling to meet their household bills, whether it's by prepayment meter, on receipt of a bill or by direct debit.

Citizens Advice Devon also provide longer-term support through initiatives that help homes become more energy efficient, as well as 'warmth bundles' to help people stay warm at home. These bundles include things like heated throws, body warmers or rechargeable hot water bottles.

Extra support for households in receipt of benefits

They will look to identify, contact and help those who may not be eligible for the other support the Government has recently made available, but who are nevertheless in need.

Food, Fuel and More from The Devon Community Foundation

We are continuing to work with the Devon Community Foundation, sharing some of the Household Support Fund with them so that they can help communities that are under-served by other support programmes, and are likely therefore to be impacted more severely by the cost of living crisis. The Foundation's 'Food, Fuel and More' programme has so far distributed more than £1.3 million in grants to voluntary and community groups. Their work supports households with disabled residents or those suffering ill-health, which has a direct impact on household income and their ability to meet food and energy bills. This also includes people experiencing homelessness and those in temporary or insecure housing; and minority ethnic communities who are not accessing support through other channels; and Traveller, Gypsy and Roma communities.

A total of £200,000 funding is available through this latest round. Small grants of up to £5,000 are available for voluntary and community groups working with people from under-served communities who are struggling to afford food, utility bills and other related essentials. Growing Communities Fund

Many local groups and organisations support their community over winter, and we support them through our Growing Communities Fund.

We set up the fund to support proactive, effective, measurable and sustainable actions to help people and communities build self-reliance and resilience, reduce loneliness and isolation, improve local people's mental health and wellbeing and reduce food and fuel inequalities.

Grants of between £500 and £1,000 are available for projects that, for example, offer communities a warm welcome and a safe space, something to eat and drink, and a place to work, learn, socialise or encourage healthy activity and address hardship. There's also support for the recruitment, training and retention of volunteers.

Free school meals

If you're struggling to pay food bills, we encourage you to check your eligibility and apply for free school meals for your child.

All children in reception, year 1 and year 2 at state schools in England automatically get free school meals. From year 3 onwards, just children whose parents are receiving certain benefits are entitled to free school meals during term time. However, parents are encouraged to apply for free school meals when they enrol their child in school, as this can help their child's school to attract additional 'pupil premium' funding to support their learning.

Some children whose parents meet the eligibility criteria and whose child attends a school nursery all day can also get a free school meal when they are two, three or four years old.

You can apply for free school meals for your child on our website,

If you have applied unsuccessfully before and your financial circumstances have since changed, please apply again.

Supermarket vouchers for the school holidays

The financial challenges faced by some families can be intensified during school holidays because of increased costs such as food, especially with the current cost of living, and reduced incomes due to childcare.

We want to make sure that no child in Devon goes hungry in the school holidays, when free school meals are unavailable. We can only do that by using some of the Government's Household Support Fund to help families who receive benefits-related free school meals during term time, to purchase food over the holidays.

Supermarket vouchers worth £45 will be sent to each child currently eligible for free school meals during term time, to spend during the Christmas holiday and February half-term break to replace the meals they would have had at school during the day. Save on childcare costs

Childcare is one of the biggest costs facing working families today.

The Government wants to make childcare more affordable and accessible to reduce the barriers that may be preventing some parents from working.

The Childcare Choices website brings together all of the existing childcare offers in one place, so parents can get the help that fits their family.

This could be through Tax Free Childcare, 30 Hours Funded Childcare, or Universal Credit Childcare. Some families might be eligible to use more than one childcare scheme together to get the most out of it.

Get a healthy start

If you're more than ten weeks pregnant or have a child under four-years-old, you may be entitled to get help to buy healthy food, such as fresh, frozen and tinned fruit and vegetables, fresh, dried, and tinned pulses and cow's milk.

If you're eligible, you'll be sent a Healthy Start card with money added to it every four weeks. You can also use your card for infant formula milk based on cow's milk and to collect vitamins for you and vitamin drops for babies and young children:- https://www.healthystart.nhs.uk/

Are you missing out on Pension Credit?

The Government is encouraging pensioners to check if they qualify for pension credit, and if so, to apply for it in order to receive the winter fuel payment, and other benefits. You'll need to apply by Saturday 21 December to get the winter fuel payment though, as that's the final date for making a backdated claim for pension credit.

Pension Credit tops up your weekly income to £218.15 if you're single; or your joint weekly income to £332.95 if you have a partner.

You can apply for Pension Credit up to four months before you reach State Pension age, or any time after you reach State Pension age, but your application can only be backdated by three months. You can apply online, over the telephone, or by post. To find out if you are eligible for Pension Credit, visit the Government's website.

Cold days, warm libraries

Libraries across Devon are continuing to throw their doors open to help communities find warmth and stay well this winter.

Staff and volunteers are pulling out all the stops to make sure people feel welcomed and supported with a range of activities and offers such as community events, free hot drinks and rails full of warm coats for anyone who needs one.

Don't fall for a loan shark. They're not your friend

With energy prices set to rise and people on lower incomes possibly worrying about their finances this winter, Trading Standards is reminding people not to be tempted by 'loan sharks'.

Loan sharks target vulnerable people who may not be able to obtain credit through mainstream providers. They may appear to be a friendly face offering a favour but can end up trapping borrowers into a cycle of debt with high interest rates. Some may use threats, intimidation, or violence if repayments cannot be met.

If it looks too good to be true, it probably is

With the cost of living crisis and particularly before Christmas people are on the lookout for a bargain. Fraudsters are aware of this and waiting to exploit you.

Research shows more than one in four people have been tricked by purchase scams, which is where a person makes a payment for goods or services online that never turn up.

Criminals often advertise technology products like phones or computers at low prices to attract buyers, persuading them to make bank transfers, then disappearing once the payment is made. They generally do this either through fake websites or fake ads on social media as well as auction sites. Check website links to make sure they are genuine. They should start with 'https' and have a padlock in the address bar which you can click on for more information about the website's security. Also read reviews online across a range of sources, such as Trustpilot or Feefo.

Never be rushed into making a purchase. Always take five to stop fraud.

Money worries and mental health

Worrying about money can have a big impact on your mental health and wellbeing, and in turn, having poor mental health can make managing your finances harder.

So it's important to do things that help you feel more in control and get support if you need it. The NHS Every Mind Matters website has lots of support and information that can help if you're facing money worries, including helping you manage your debt, which can help reduce the immediate stress.

Cheaper broadband and phone packages

Some broadband and phone providers offer cheaper packages to help customers on low incomes. They're called 'social tariffs', although some providers call them 'essential' or 'basic' broadband.

They're delivered in the same way as normal packages, just at a lower price.

Most providers require you to be in receipt of certain benefits to qualify. You can check if your current provider offers a social tariff on the Ofcom website, and if they do you can contact them and ask to switch.
